Those words are the bedrock on which we stand when demanding equal opportunities for life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness, as we see fit. May we all strive to live up to those noble ideals, and may future generations look upon us with more mercy and understanding than we show today when they judge our current actions by their future moral codes.
